In FY 1999, magistrates decided over 36 40 percent of disability cases. While the use of magistrate judges is well accepted in this and other contexts, 37 they are in fact Article I rather than Article III deciders. They are often called upon to perform routine matters (like overseeing discovery disputes) or to make decisions in situations with repetitive fact patterns, like SSA disability cases.
